Innocence Project of Texas Externship Fall 2014

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Course Description:

This program combines real-world experience with academic study by including a classroom component in which faculty members guide and encourage discussion on how the experiences relate to other aspects of a student's legal education.

The Innocence Project of Texas is a nonprofit organization dedicated to investigating and litigating claims of innocence made by those convicted of serious crimes in Texas. Each student is in charge of multiple investigations to help determine if an inmate is innocent, how the project can prove the inmate's innocence, and how to obtain the prisoner's release.

Students earn 2 hours of credit for the course, which includes a two-hour classroom component taught by School of Law faculty and completion of 130 hours of casework.

Expected Learning Outcomes:

Upon completion of the course, the student should have:

- 1. General knowledge of the Texas criminal justice system, with a focus on post-conviction remedies for wrongfully convicted individuals.
- 2. General understanding of the causes of wrongful convictions.
- 3. General understanding of various bases of post conviction relief such as junk science, DNA, recantations, etc.

Methods for Assessing Expected Learning Outcomes:

The expected learning outcomes for the course will be determined by the students' performance in topics relevant to the course by the following: (1) Assigned Readings, (2) Class Participation and Completion of required Hours, and (3) Completion of one or more Case Memo and Trial Transcript Summary.

Course Requirements:

<u>Assigned Readings</u>: Reading assignments will be designated for each class meeting. Students will be expected to complete these assignments and engage in class discussion on relevant topics.

<u>Case Memo and Trial Transcript Summary</u>: Each student or group will be expected to complete a case memo and trial transcript summary for their assigned case or cases. Templates for these are provided on the Case Materials disc.

Class Participation: All students are expected to actively participate in class discussion.

<u>Class Attendance:</u> Class attendance is expected. One (1) unexcused absence will be allowed. If a student is unable to be present for class, they should notify Professor Mirll in advance.

<u>Hours Requirement:</u> Each student is required to complete 130 hours of casework. Many hours can be completed in the students' own time. All students must get at least 5 hours/week of their work in the IPTX office.

*Fulfillment of all Work Assigned by Professor Myhra: Professor Myhra will assign weekly journals and a final reflection paper that must be completed to receive credit in this course.

<u>Student Responsibility /Likelihood of Success</u>: If a student needs clarification on any course assignment, then it is his/her responsibility to request clarification from the instructor. To increase the likelihood of successful performance on any course assignment, the student is required to attend class, take notes, and read assigned material.

Academic Dishonesty Policy: Academic dishonesty (e.g., cheating on in-class activities or exams) will not be tolerated. The first occurrence of academic dishonesty will result in a 0 for the activity or exam and a report will be filed with Student Judicial Programs and the Law School. A second occurrence of academic dishonesty will result in failing the course and filing an additional report.
